There are two waka in *Mana Whenua*. One is a **waka hourua** (sea-voyaging canoe) and the other is a **waka taua** (war canoe). They were used for long sea voyages. The other, *Teremoe* (beside the cafe), is a **waka taua** and was used for carrying war parties. What are some differences between them?

1 NGĀ WAKA THE CANOES

Many different parts make up a marae (meeting place). The main building is called the **whareniui**. The **whareniui** Te Hau ki Turanga was built by Raharahu Rukupo in memory of his older brother, Tamati Waka Mangere.

Stand in front of the **whareniui**. Can you find the spot Raharahu reserved for his **tuakana**, Tamati? (Hint: Look up.) Draw an arrow to show where you found him.

Why do you think Raharahu wanted Tamati to be part of this **whareniui**?

2 TE HAU KI TURANGA THE SPIRIT OF TURANGA

Whareniui connect **tipuna** to the present generation. The builder of Te Hau ki Turanga, Raharahu, is also part of the **whareniui**. To see him, walk in the **kuwaha** and turn to your left.

Choose your favourite person and draw them in the space provided.


